Observation Status Toolkit

Observation Status Toolkit from the Center for Medicare Advocacy

The Center for Medicare Advocacy has a new toolkit on observation status. Observation status is an "outpatient" category used by hospitals to bill Medicare. People are often not told of their observation status, and many people are designated as observation status even when they are extremely sick and spend several days in the hospital. Notably, observation status can affect patients' ability to obtain Medicare coverage if they need nursing home care after their stay in the hospital. Medicare only covers nursing home care for patients who had a 3-day inpatient stay; observation status does not count towards the inpatient stay. The Center for Medicare Advocacy's Observation Status toolkit includes a fact sheet on the topic, FAQs, and a beneficiary self-help packet. They are also seeking stories about beneficiaries' experiences with observation status.
